

Taking the higher road

John's talk on Sunday 20th January challenged us all to take the higher road, to answer God's second call on our lives. The time for being carried by the father is over. It's time to step out in faith.

Following on from this John spoke on fear (Sunday 27th January). Most people are resistant to change. Quite simply, most people would prefer to stay with the status quo (not the rock band) rather than venture out into something new, or something unknown.

So what are the characteristics of the higher road? Well, it's a less travelled highway, it's rocky and errr...higher. It is a harder road; the cost to us as individuals is much greater, the sacrifice of time and resources is what God requires of us.

There's also a higher level of danger and there is the risk of failure, but as Paul writing to Philippians says in chapter 1 v 21 – "for me to live is Christ, and to die is gain" (Richard Kay reminded us of this last Sunday).

Part of taking the higher road is getting involved with Hope08 – now I'm not suggesting that any of us are going to perish as we commit to this initiative. But Paul goes on to say in v 22 - "if I am to go on living in this body, this will mean fruitful labour".

So, Hope, this is what God requires of us – fruitful labour. Just a few projects started this year, but a few projects where all of us find that through our fruitful labour Heaven is established on earth.

In choosing the higher road, we get a glimpse of His plans for us, for our church and the world out there. Seek God for what He wants you to do, but don't expect His answer to be constrained by your own personal limitations, lovingly He will push you on to a higher place.


We are incredibly blessed at Hope by the wonderful preaching and teaching given by John and others.

'Traditionally people have given up things for Lent. Last year in the



Tearfund's Carbon Fast will show you how.







Cheer up, it's Lent

• The nursery continues with its great work with the amazingly dedicated team under Linda's leadership.








• All centre staff, including volunteer staff for the café, have smart new badges.

For these reasons and more, the founding by William Cameron Townsend (1896-1982) ... of the Wycliffe Bible Translators may stand symbolically for one of the great Christian events of the age.'
