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Special Educational Needs Regional Partnerships

The Department for Education and Skills (DfES) is encouraging the development of partnerships to meet special educational needs. It wants the government, local authorities, other local agencies and parents to work more closely together to support the education of pupils with SEN.

With this in mind, the DfES has provided funding for eleven Regional Partnerships covering all local education authorities in England. Each Partnership brings together representatives from LEAs, health services, social services, Parent Partnership Services and the private and voluntary sectors.

The overall aim of the partnerships is to work with all agencies to help even out the variations across the country in how we provide for pupils' needs. In the first phase, the Partnerships concentrated on provision for children with low incidence disabilities.

The West Midlands SEN Partnership

The West Midlands Partnership is developing interagency working, both locally and regionally. More recently, it has focused on Autistic Spectrum Disorders (ASD), looking at policy and practice across the region. It has carried out a widespread survey of parents' views which have been taken into account in the final report. The Partnership will work towards putting in place the recommendations of the report, and towards improving the effectiveness of services across the West Midlands.



The work of the West Midlands Partnership has now developed to include a focus on Emotional, Social and Behavioural Difficulties (ESBD). The aim is to improve services to this group of children and their families. Arrangements have already been made to consult with a group of Warwickshire parents and the Partnership is keen to talk with as many parents as possible to hear their views.

New support group


A new support group has been launched for the parents of disabled children from Nuneaton and Bedworth's minority ethnic communities.

I applied to join the V.I.P.S. training course with a little apprehension. I need not have worried, though, as everyone was very friendly (the Coventry and Warwickshire Parent Partnership Services joined together for these meetings). There were seven weekly sessions, covering a wide range of topics, from developing listening skills to gaining an in-depth knowledge about statements and annual review meetings. Ground rules and confidential matters were agreed. Participants were given a number of useful handouts.
